Most dealer auctions in the United States are owned by a company called **“Manheim”**.

Manheim is also international and has auctions in China and other countries including U.S. Territories.

Another dealer auction chain is called **“Adesa”**. Adeasa is more popular on the east coast and Canada, but has a few locations on the west coast as well.

If you are into SALVAGE vehicles, I would try **Copart** or **IAA**.
